Part 2 - Sermon Review

Part 3 - Digging Deeper - Distinguishing Saving from Hoarding

Saving is a means of not presuming upon God. Hoarding is a means of replacing God. Saving can avoid presuming upon others to assume responsibility for our future needs. Hoarding is a self absorbed commitment to independence from others who could help us if we were in need, just as we can and should help others.

When I save, I lay something aside for future need. If I sense God's leading, I will give it away to meet greater needs. When I hoard, I'm unwilling to part with what I've saved to meet other's needs, because my possible future needs outweigh their actual present needs. Hence, I fail to love my neighbor as myself.

The difference between saving and hoarding isn't simply the amount but the attitude. Nonetheless, there's a vast difference between saving five hundred dollars or a few thousand dollars for a "rainy day" and saving a quarter of a million dollars that could last a rainy decade. Some lay up enough to survive a stormy century! In seeking to provide for our future needs, we should not neglect those who are currently needy. Our plenty will supply what they need.
